
However, being able to share in our student's delight with their results (see more on page 3) was a very positive diversion and a great opportunity to reinforce why making sure the plans we have made for our return to the business of education is so fundamentally important as we move forward into the Autumn term.

This week has seen our students return to the school and take part in a tutor induction to ensure everyone is reacclimatised to being back in the building but also up to speed with the Covid-19 procedures we have put in place.

The overwhelming majority of our students have returned to school positively and sensibly this week. However, I would ask parents and carers to continue to remind children that whilst they are not socially 'distant' in lessons, it is not appropriate to physically touch other students - whether as a joke or in passing. It was apparent that our older students really understood this, some of our younger students were a little less aware.

We just need to ensure all students understand making physical contact with other students could lead to serious consequences. Thank you.

Furthermore, from the communication we have received from parents, we feel more confident students and parents are aware of what to do in the event that they, or a member of their household or support bubble



presents with Covid-19 symptoms and is awaiting a test result - i.e. they need to contact the school and self-isolate until the results are back.

As such our phased return will be brought forward and next week we will see the return of the following year groups on the following days:

Monday — Years 7, 9 and 11 Tuesday — Years 8, 10 and Sixth Form

Wednesday — All year groups


You will need your Lunch Pass Card to leave site and must have no 'comments' in your Student Planner.



GCSE and A Levels

Throughout Years 12 and 13, our #TeamHeadlands Sixth Form students have worked incredibly hard, supported by our superb Sixth Form teachers and leadership team. As a result, they have secured some truly inspiring academic A-Level results despite the incredibly difficult circumstances over the last few months.

25% of our students secured an A-Level A* / A grade, 62% of students achieved an A-Level A* - B and 85% of students achieved an A-Level A*-C (nationally this figure was 78.4% - we smashed it!)

around the globe.

- Luke Sissons was our top performing student securing A*, A, A, A, and he is now going on to study Mathematics at Durham University.
- Olivia Kelly has secured her first-choice place at Sunderland University Medical School to study Medicine in September having gained A*, A, A in her A-Levels.
- Yasemin Dogan secured her first-choice place at Leeds University to study Law, achieving A, A, B grades.
- William Jaggar secured his first -choice place at Bristol University going on to study Biochemistry with A, B, B grades.

Alongside this, Luke Wright and Isabelle Marshall, our Headlands Sixth Form Scholars this year, have both succeeding in receiving a grant for £30,000 to pay for their university tuition fees. Luke is going to York University to study Archaeology, having achieved B, B, C in his A-Levels and Isabelle is going to the Hull York Medical School to study Medicine, having achieved A, B, C. A huge well done to both!

We are also proud to report that over 50% of the Year 11 cohort have now returned to our successful 6th Form. Great to have you all back as part of Team Headlands.

At GCSE. 79% of our students secured a Grade 4 or above in English and Maths and nearly 50% secured Grade 5 or above! This was brilliant! Nationally in English in 2020 81% of students achieved a Grade 4, at Headlands our students achieved 88%! In Maths, nationally in 2020, 78% achieved a Grade 4 -

again at Headlands our students secured above the national average with 81% "banking" that grade!
