Premier league clubs face being blocked from appointing top foreign managers under strict new rules that threaten to change the face of English football. Under post-Brexit immigration guidelines adopted by the FA and Home Office last month, Ole Gunnar Solskjaer and Marcelo Bielsa would have been denied permission to work in this country at the time they were appointed by Manchester and Leeds respectively, and the appointments of dozens of coaches throughout the Premier League and EFL could be blocked in future.

It's a Sin

"It's a Sin" is a 5 part drama on All 4 set in the 1980's around the beginning of the AIDs pandemic in the UK, specifically London. It centers around a group of flat mates, most of which being young gay students, and the changes the pandemic brought to their lives. The stories in this series are very accurate to how many gay people lived during this time, it is this depiction that will leave you loving all the characters by the end of the series, seeing their growth into the adulthood.

It is a brilliant watch, highlighting the effects AIDs had to the mentality and physicality of all those involved with the disease in its early years, while also showing the spirit that drove this community through such a dark period.

At times, this show may leave you feeling uncomfortable, but it is this

emotion that will have you continuing through, as it is these feelings the characters and the people during this time period had.

If you ever need a series to binge one weekend, choose this and you will not be disappointed.
