This week, we welcomed Guest Speakers from the Cancer Charity Oddballs. They led information sessions for students about the charity and the work they do to raise awareness of testicular cancer and other causes associated with mental and physical health.

The OddBalls Foundation was founded in 2016, to raise awareness of Testicular Cancer. Through the Foundation they hope to make a difference to male health around the world.

One of the main ways they deliver their message is through their

University Ambassador scheme. The Ambassadors visit schools, universities and workplaces, delivering talks on Testicular Cancer — reminding boys and men to check their balls - and remove any stigma and embarrassment about it!

Some statistics as to why this message is so important - Testicular Cancer is around 95% curable so early diagnosis and regular checking is important.

The aim of the Foundation is to fit as many 'check yourself' guides into male toilets and changing rooms across the country.

Feedback from our students (and our staff) was they found these sessions really insightful and will, we are confident, help to save lives

Oliver tackles the London Marathon

Former #TeamHeadlands student Oliver is running the London Marathon this weekend.

On his fund-raising webpage, he explains:

My name is Oliver, I'm 21 years old and I was born with Cystic Fibrosis (CF) at birth and Cystic Fibrosis Related Diabetes (CFRD) in November 2019. CF is a genetic condition affecting more than 10,600 people in the UK. It is a condition that causes a build up of thick, sticky mucus in the lungs, digestive system and other organs, affecting the whole body.

Due to the thick, sticky mucus bacteria can easily become trapped causing infections. In terms of treatment I take numerous medications and undergo physiotherapy every day as well as needing to exercise regularly in order to loosen the mucus, allowing air to pass through the lungs easier and to stay fit and healthy.

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I'm running the London Marathon in hope to raise more awareness for CF and raise as much money as possible that could lead to more ground-breaking treatments for individuals like myself who live with the condition.
