

Headteacher's message

Whilst it's been an incredibly busy week in the Houses of Parliament this week, and as I write this week's Headlines we currently have no Secretary of State for Education, I am pleased to report we have had another very productive and positive week here at Headlands School!

On Tuesday night Mr Cooke (Assistant Headteacher 6th Form) attended East Riding College Awards Evening to celebrate Alfie Grimshaw winning "Academy Engagement Award" for Headlands School as part of the Health Academy. This is a very prestigious Award and we wish Alfie every success in his future studies at Imperial College, London studying Medicine in September.

Looking forward to September, this week we have welcomed back over 60 students from Year 11 for our 6th Form "Taster" week. It has been great to see them back in School and when they start in September they will have the opportunity to apply for places in our Health Academy. A reminder for those that don't know, "The Health Academy" is a Sixth Form partnership between East Riding College, Headlands School, Bridlington School, The Hull York Medical School and the Practice Two Doctors Surgery in Bridlington.

Our Year 6 Transition Days were a great success on Thursday and Friday. This is the first time we have been able to 'properly' undertake Transition Days and it certainly feels like we are more "back to normal" in the day to day running of the School. As a parent of a child in Year 6 transitioning to secondary School I completely appreciate what an exciting and nerve wracking time this is and trust the team here at Headlands School have made our new cohort

feel very welcome and less worried about the "big" move in September.

Mrs Stamford (Deputy Head -Quality of Education) has met with all year groups this week to share with them a clear insight into the detail contained in their Summer Term Academic Reports. The Senior Team and I have then had the opportunity this week to meet with individual students and talk through their progress, attitude towards their studies and most importantly their emotional wellbeing. As I have mentioned previously this is always a highlight of my term and so far I have had lots of very happy children and even some "fist pumps" in the air celebrating the real joy of a great report! Brilliant!

We have also used these assemblies as an opportunity to share with students our re-shaping of our Rewards activities, in light of feedback from the students themselves. In particular students have been keen to vocalise that if we are calling an event or activity a "Reward" why should they, or rather parents/ carers, have to pay for it? We agree. So moving forward we are making a distinction between a "Cultural Experience" (which students will be asked to pay for) and "Rewards Experiences" (which the School will pay for). As such students are aware the planned Rewards Event to Flamingo Land in September 2022 will be 'invitation only' and we are inviting all the students who have met specific criteria which includes zero comments. This is approximately 150 students across Years 7 - 10. As you can imagine communicating this to the students has then led to some "feedback" in terms of is this "fair?" The reality is, experience tells us, whatever criteria we set, some children will feel they are

being unfairly treated. This is hard to get away from however, as I am sure you will appreciate, we have to set criteria to allow us to determine which students should be Rewarded. In the Summer Term of 2023 we plan to run a "Cultural Experience" day to Flamingo Land which will be open to a wider set of criteria, which students will need to again meet, and students will also be required to pay for this "Experience" themselves, rather than the School. Finally the team and I would like to emphasise here, we are super keen to Reward as many students as we can who are getting it "right" and have totally revamped our Reward's Policy for September 2022 in consultation with the students. However please remember in times of austerity, which is having a significant impact on us all, School budgets really are stretched and we are all having to do more, with less available funds.

To end, this week the interviews for our Headlands Scholarships were held. As always the decision to award two of our students a Scholarship of £30,000, which is a life changing amount, is always incredibly difficult. After much debate and deliberation two of our amazing students - Courtney Beasley and Lexie Dimitri - have been awarded the Scholarship. This is an amazing achievement as the field was incredibly strong. Courtney is going to Coventry University, Scarborough in September to study to be a Primary School Teacher and Lexie is going to study Biomedical Science at Newcastle University. It is Lexie's intention to transfer this degree to a Medicine Degree after her 1st year. Congratulations to them both and wishing them every success for the future.
