Next week I am attending the first PFI Meeting where the 6

schools in Bridlington who are part of the PFI project will have the opportunity to review the Local Authorities "Lead Out Plan." The PFI Contract ceases in April 2028. Now this might not seem like a long way off, however the Infrastructure and Projects Authority, who report to the Cabinet Office and HM Treasury highlight in their report "Preparing for PFI Contract Expiry" the following:

"The expiry phase of PFI contracts, including asset handback and the transition to future services provision, presents additional risks, including potential operational disruption, lack

of service continuity, financial loss and reputational damage. The effective management of the expiry process is therefore of particular importance."

Our understanding is the expiry phase of the PFI contract is led by the Local Authority. We also know this is going to be a complex process and intend to be as involved in this transition as we can be to ensure it is as smooth as possible for our School and in turn our students. I will update you on this "Lead Out Plan" over the coming weeks and months.
