Logistics Careers Information Evening (Hull KR Stadium)

Parents and students from Headlands attended a presentation about the Logistics industry on Thursday 8th June. This presentation was given as part of a funded pilot project in collaboration with the Leicestershire Enterprise Partnership and the Chartered Institute of Logistic and Transport.



What is Logistics?

The overall process of managing how resources are acquired, stored, and transported to a final destination.

Why is logistics important?

Logistics has been around a very long time but came to the fore during the pandemic as most of us now order most of our goods online, we rely on the logistics companies to get all of those goods to us from all over the World.

Will there be jobs in Logistics?

The logistics industry is set to grow 3 fold in the next 10 years and therefore there will be numerous opportunities for careers. The present employed population in the industry is beginning to age and all companies are now looking for new recruits to inspire and develop the future of their businesses in an ever changing and modernising World.

Three main presentations were given, two from the UK's largest logistics companies and a third from Hull University now specialising in delivering higher education with a variety of Logistics courses. Over 5% of the Humber region are employed in logistics and Wincanton employ over 21,000 people with over 8,500 vehicles in a variety of roles and its not just driving lorries! Both companies offer a variety of roles in Human Resources, Data and ICT management, Planning and Operations etc. Transport is not just limited to lorries either, as Kuehne+Nagal work in over 100+ countries, air and sea transport are specialised roles they offer too. So there are plenty of opportunities to travel and work abroad gaining Worldwide experience. Trainee graduates gave an overview of their career progression and the wide range of opportunities and support they have received from their employers through University, training and job enhancement. Full Council will meet next week to discuss a range of issues including teacher pay, school funding and the balloting of members on strike action.

I know I have mentioned this previously but I do believe it is worth reiterating. The education profession has been striking in recent months for a fully funded pay award. When workers decide to strike they withdraw their services and do not get paid. From recent conversations with parents in respect of term

time holidays, there does appear to be a misconception that striking employees are taking a "holiday" themselves. This really isn't the case and to ensure our country's schools (today and in the future) have appropriate funding to pay and retain quality teachers and associate staff, schools need to be funded accordingly.

In more local news, this week our Transition Team has continued to visit our Primary Feeder schools to meet our future Year 7 students for September 2023. This is both an exciting and nerve wracking time for our Primary leavers and we hope to make this move to secondary school as stress-free as possible. Sri Lanka Book Appeal

Back in 2006 there was a disaster in Sri Lanka in the form of a giant Tsunami, this resulted in a large loss of life and devastation of towns and infrastructure. Lions Clubs International immediately sent financial and practical help, which is the normal practice to help those in need.

The Lions district which Bridlington is in, launched an appeal and raised £45,000, which was sent to the Lions of Sri Lanka, and used to build a new communal centre and also to build accommodation. The District Governor at that time was a member of Minster Lions Club of York, and he went to Sri Lanka to officially open the new facility. As he went round the site, he was shown a Library but there were no books, when asked what happened to the books, he was told that they were all destroyed by the Tsunami.

On return to England, a new project was started to collect books and send them out, this was organised by Minster Lion Club. Bridlington Lions Club became involved in the collection of books in 2012 and since then there have been more than 150,000 books donated. Unfortunately when Covid broke out around the world, the project had to stop.

Now the project is being restarted but this time it is being done in a different way. The Lions Clubs in Sri Lanka have initiated a fantastic new project by converting old buses to mobile libraries so that they can deliver books to libraries and schools around the country and are now anxious to receive more children's books.

Team Headlands have said that we would support this appeal so please could you have a look at home and see if there are any children's books (aged from early years up to secondary) that you would like to donate to this great cause?

Your child can bring them in and pass them to their tutor teacher and we will ensure they get sent on and make a real difference in Sri Lanka. The Lions have sent 4 banana boxes and we would love to see them full of children's books before we break for Summer!
