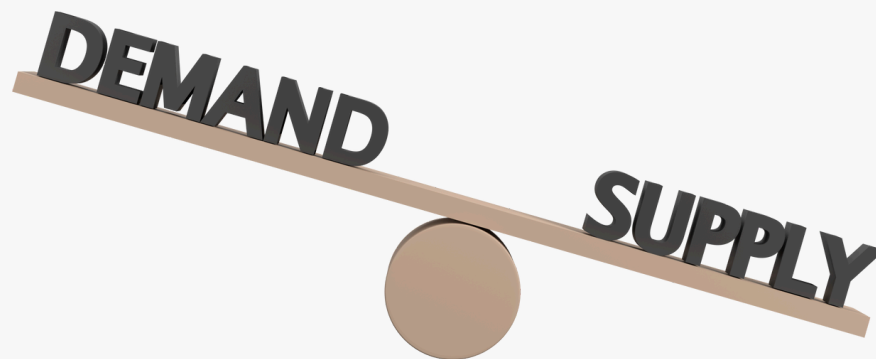

It's where people offer their skills, qualifications, and experience to employers in exchange for paid work (labour).

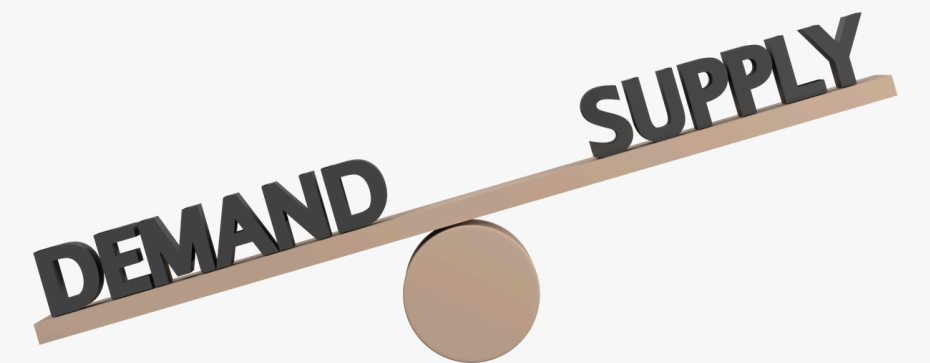


Demand can change

The skills and qualifications employers are looking for and the number of workers they are looking for can change.

Supply can change

Sometimes more people are looking for work. Sometimes less. Increased supply of workers mean employers can pay less.

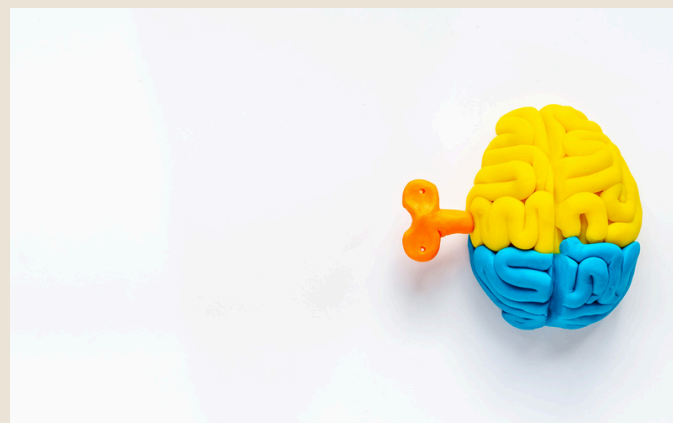


WHAT IS LMI?

Labour market information (LMI) is data that reflects what is going on in the labour market. It can help us make informed decisions by providing information about what is going on in the world of work.



WHAT ABOUT LABOUR MARKET INTELLIGENCE?



Quantitative Data

Facts and figures about jobs and employment e.g. how many people are looking for work; how many jobs; salary; hours; trends

Qualitative Data

Insights into what the world of work and specific jobs or industries or types of work are like.

Labour market intelligence

Where labour market information is applied to your situation and needs.



LMI CAN HELP US TO UNDERSTAND THE WORLD OF WORK:

- The kind and number of jobs available (by area/sector)

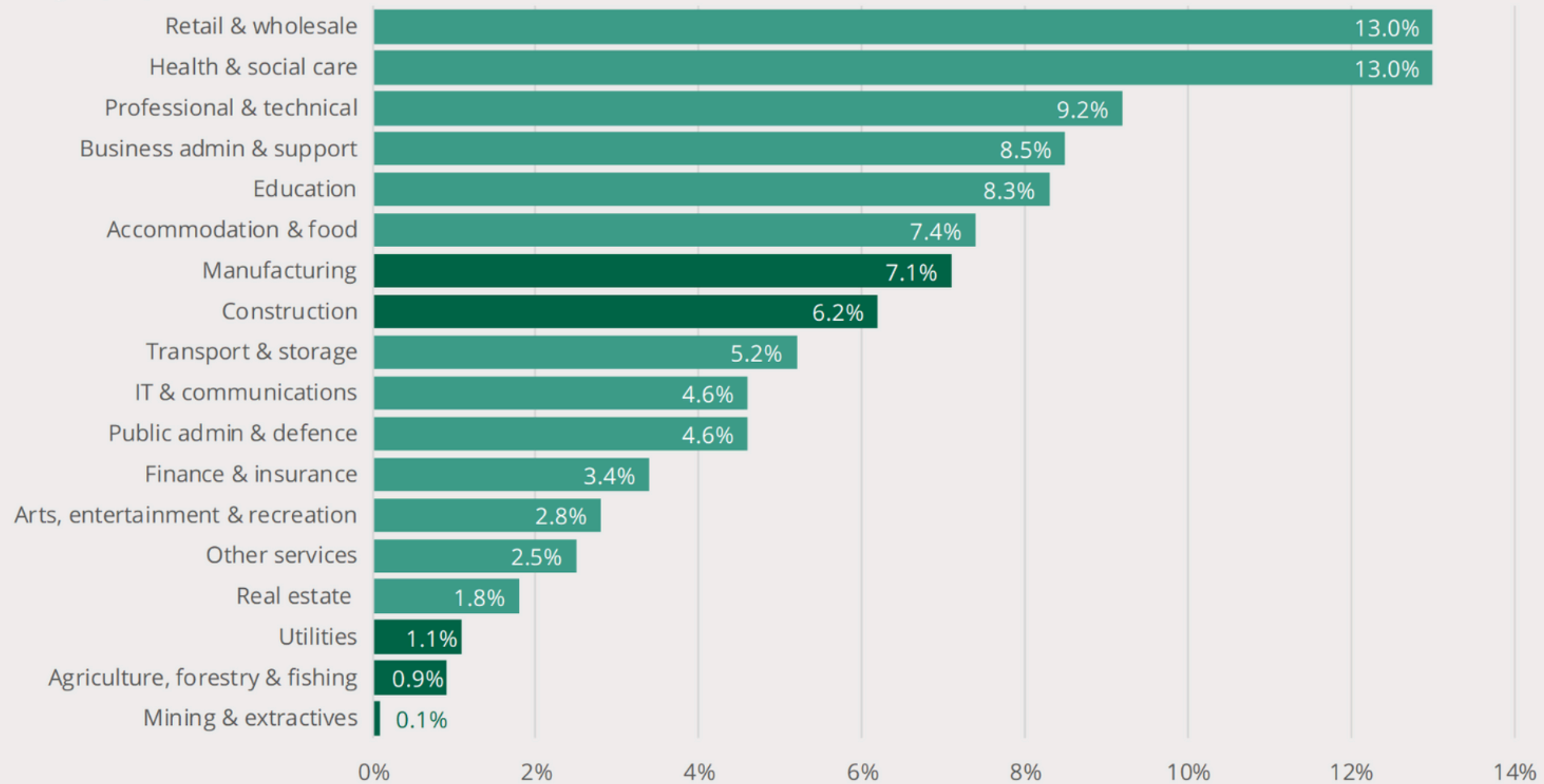

EXECUTIVE SUMMARY

Writing on work futures is generally in agreement about the major drivers of change, including technological change — artificial intelligence, robots and big data, as well as innovation in materials, propulsion and energy strategies, climate change, globalization, population pressures and changed demographic profiles. The implications for jobs are more vague, and futurists spread along a continuum stretching from predictions of dystopian futures to optimistic predictions of a better life for all.

In this research we review the literature on work futures, noting a long history of concerns about technological disruption that have proved unfounded in the broad sense, but acknowledging that the disruptive effects of the drivers above will lead to uneven patterns of change. Machines are already taking over many repetitive jobs and increasingly encroach on professional work such as accountancy or office work. It is apparent that there will be a shift in emphasis to more skilled, and professional jobs, but pundits are divided on whether these changes will bring net job losses or net job creation.

Trends away from routine jobs towards non-routine manual and especially cognitive skill work are already apparent, and will continue. There are a number of threads in the literature concerning the skills that will be increasingly valued in the new workplace. These include entrepreneurial skills, involving adaptability, autonomy and self-direction, in a situation where workers will need to sell their skills across many jobs, and incorporate freelance work among these. Increasingly, people in all jobs will need digital skills, and STEM / STEAM skills are

Anticipated changes to the labour market threaten to exacerbate existing skills shortages, which are already a major issue. There are currently over a million job vacancies in this country. Findings from our programme of research, the Skills Imperative 2035, suggest that existing skills shortages could worsen - implying urgent action is needed to prevent knock-on effects to our economy and society.

This report is the third to be published by The Skills Imperative 2035: Essential skills for tomorrow's workforce research programme and identifies the skills that will be most needed in the future labour market. This report utilises employment projections that were reliant on data from the Labour Force Survey (LFS) up to 2021.

Unfortunately, the Office for National Statistics (ONS) announced in 2022 they had made coding errors in the LFS. The document below explains this issue and the impact on our skills projections, which is fortunately limited. Revised tables and figures from Working paper 3 are also provided.
