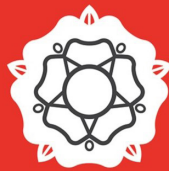
## FILM FESTIVAL

## MRS BONE'S NEWSFLASH

This week, our students took part in two important assemblies led by visitors from Humberside Fire and Rescue Service and Humberside Police.

Water Safety with Humberside Fire and Rescue Service  
Humberside Fire and Rescue Service delivered a powerful assembly about the dangers of swimming in open water. As the warmer weather continues, students are reminded that rivers, lakes, reservoirs and the sea can all present hidden dangers, even on hot days. They learned about the risks of cold-water shock, strong currents and unseen hazards beneath the surface. The key safety messages included:

- Never enter open water to swim unless it is a designated, supervised area.
- Never jump or dive into unknown water.
- If someone gets into difficulty, call 999 immediately and never enter the water to attempt a rescue.
- If you unexpectedly fall into water, try to stay calm

and Float to Live until you can control your breathing and call for help.

We encourage families to discuss these important safety messages at home, particularly as children may spend more time outdoors during the summer months down at the beach. These messages form part of Humberside Fire and Rescue Service's ongoing work to reduce accidental drownings and improve water safety awareness.

Lifestyle Challenge with Humberside Police  
Representatives from Humberside Police introduced students to the Lifestyle Challenge, a long-running summer initiative for young people aged 10–18. The challenge encourages teams to work together on projects that make a positive difference in their local communities.

Projects can focus on areas such as environmental

improvement, supporting local charities, promoting healthy lifestyles, helping neighbours, improving community spaces or raising awareness of important issues. As well as benefiting the community, participants develop valuable teamwork, leadership, communication and problem-solving skills.

The Lifestyle Challenge provides an excellent opportunity for young people to stay active, make new friends and contribute positively during the summer holidays. 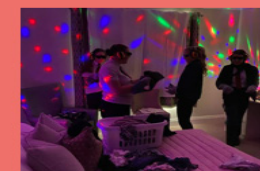
## YEAR 10 HEALTH & SOCIAL CARE
